



Covid Catch-Up Funding 2020-2021

What catch-up funding is for

The government announced £1 billion of funding to support children and young people to catch up lost time after school closure. This is especially important for the most vulnerable and disadvantaged backgrounds. This funding includes:

- a one-off universal £650 million catch up premium for the 2020 to 2021 academic year to ensure that schools have the support they need to help all pupils make up for lost teaching time
- a £350 million [National Tutoring Programme](#) to provide additional, targeted support for those children and young people who need the most help, which includes:
 - a school's programme for 5 to 16-year-olds – for more information, see the [National Tutoring Programme FAQs](#)
 - a [16 to 19 tuition fund](#)
 - an oral language intervention programme for [reception-aged children](#)

How catch-up funding should be used

Schools should use this funding for specific activities to support their pupils to catch up for lost teaching over the previous months, in line with the curriculum expectations for the next academic year in [actions for schools during the coronavirus outbreak](#).

While schools can use their funding in a way that suits their cohort and circumstances, they are expected to use this funding for specific activities which will help pupils catch up on missed education.

To support schools to make the best use of this funding, the Education Endowment Foundation (EEF) has published a [coronavirus \(COVID-19\) support guide for schools](#) with evidence-based approaches to catch up for all students.

To support schools to implement their catch-up plans effectively, EEF has published the [school planning guide: 2020 to 2021](#). This will provide further guidance on how schools should implement catch-up strategies and supporting case studies to highlight effective practice.

Three Strands of Need

Using the EEF (Education Endowment Foundation) support strategies we are addressing the challenges which the pandemic have brought, by focusing on the following three areas:

Access to technology	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Enabling students to overcome the barrier of lack of access to technology Ensuring the provision of the most appropriate platforms, software and hardware.
Summer support	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Providing transition summer schools and remote transition activities and continuing this over other school breaks in order to maximise teaching time across the year

Allocation of Funding

As the specific needs may change, depending on the proportion of the remainder of the year being remote learning or face to face provision, there is still some funding waiting to be most appropriately allocated.
